Beginning in 2021, ESI presented the first "Check 6" Award at the company's Annual Supplier Appreciation Day. The award was named in honor of Leo Reynolds, Founder of Electronics Systems Inc., who passed away last year.

Leo served in the U.S. Air Force before beginning his engineering career. "Check 6" is what a military aviator says when he's asking another pilot to check his most vulnerable position. The implied response of that other pilot is, "I have your back!"

The "Check 6" Award, which will be presented annually, recognizes the supplier who "had our back" throughout the year, ensuring that our customers continued to receive Legendary Service.

This year, we presented the Leo Reynolds – "Check 6" Award to BOH Electronics,

Inc. More than once, BOH exceeded ESI's expectations in the requests (and miracles) we asked them to perform. If they could get something to us tomorrow — they would.
